Principal's Report

Welcome to Term 3, 2017

The start of Term 3 has been a busy and rewarding one. Students have returned to commence the Semester 2 Assessment period and we will continue to remind students that attendance, being packed for learning, being in class on time and applying themselves with 5 for effort are the foundations for success. This term there are again many exciting opportunities for students in leadership, extension and enrichment programs, sporting teams, cultural programs and community participation programs.

Kokoda Trail Overseas Excursion

Approval was provided by the Department of Education to conduct the Kokoda Trail Overseas Excursion which is a collaboration between Richmond High School and Colo High School. The eleven students and three teachers departed Sydney on Friday 28th July and flew to Port Moresby. From there they took local transport to the beginning of the 10 day trek. I wish all students and staff a safe and informative time. The historical and cultural significance of the Kokoda Trail to Australians is well documented.



School Development Day Term 3

Staff returned to work on Monday 17th July and spent the School Development Day focussing on catering for individual student learning needs. This approach recognises that all students learn in different ways. It also recognises that some students require adjustments to the work and activities that teachers develop and implement. This also relates to students with disabilities. Staff investigated different strategies they can implement to ensure that all students can access the curriculum. This focus will continue with follow up workshops for staff to identify and explore other strategies they can use to make adjustments.

Year 10 Subject Selection

On Tuesday 25th July the Year 10 Subject Selection evening took place in the MAC. Congratulations to Mrs

Cullen, Mrs Perry and Mr Gordon on the organisation of and presentations for the event. Students and their parents were able to listen to the information and rules around the award of the Higher School Certificate as well as find out specific requirements for each course offered at the school. Mrs Cullen and Mr Anderson have also organised every student to be interviewed before they submit their final selection. This is the foundation of the Senior School at Richmond High and it is important that students select their course on the basis of what they are good at, what they are interested in and courses that match their future career aspirations.

Milton Alston Centre (The MAC)

As announced by the NSW Government and as reported in the last newsletter, the Department of Education are funding the construction of an upgraded multi-purpose centre. This will be located next to the MAC and in front of the Ball Courts. It will provide a facility with the infrastructure to support many of the current technologies for performance and production as well as a sporting facility. The Department of Education will be setting up a booth at the Hawkesbury Library, Richmond with more detailed information.

Deputy Principal's Report

Subject Selections

The timetable process for 2018 is now in full swing with <u>Year 10</u> just having attended their Senior Subject Selection Evening in Week 2, which was a highly successful evening with over 200 people, including approximately 80 students in attendance. Nearly 90 selection forms have already been returned and the Senior Executive Team are currently making decisions regarding the subjects that will run for Year 11, 2018. Any students who miss out on a subject(s) will be re-interviewed to ensure they get the best available options from the line structure.

I have been very impressed with **Year 10** throughout the process and I know Mrs Cullen is looking forward to working with them again next year. However, they have been reminded that their HSC begins NOW and that they ALL need to be achieving 4 or 5 effort ratings on their Semester 2 Reports. If they don't begin to work and develop the habits of a senior student now, they will find it very difficult to adjust next year. They should be completing all set tasks to the best of their ability and even looking at doing an extra 5-10% on top of what is expected by their teachers.

Year 8 have received their Elective Booklet for 2018 this week and have a form to return to the Front Office by Thursday 3rd August 2017 (a "first in best dressed" policy for subjects as they fill). Students should carefully read about the subjects they are considering and talk to their parents regarding the subject fees and safety equipment required for some of the subjects. The best advice I can offer for selecting 3 elective subjects for 2018, is to select subjects that you LIKE and/or are GOOD at. Please talk to your teachers about the contents of their elective subjects and DO NOT make choices based on "what your friends are doing", as you will be doing these subjects 6 periods per fortnight for the entire

year – it can be a long year if you choose unwisely.

Year 9 have been sent home with a letter last week that outlines the 3 electives that they studied this year. They will then have to select 2 electives only for Year 10 in 2018. ONE of those 2 electives has to be ONE of the electives studied this year. Subjects that did not have enough numbers to run this year or new subjects on offer, may be selected as the second selection for 2018; for example: there is a new English Elective called "Media Industry Studies". These letters will need to be returned to me by Thursday 3rd August 2017.

Year 11 will complete their Preliminary HSC at the end of Term 3, with the culmination being their Yearly Examinations in Weeks 9 & 10 (14th – 21st Sept). They will then begin their HSC Year in Term 4. All students will need to have ensured that they have met Board of Studies requirements for their Preliminary Courses before they can begin HSC courses. If students have received "N Award" warning letters in the mail, I suggest that they are read carefully and that they work with their teachers to ensure that the issues are addressed and resolved as soon as possible. Being given an N Determination in a Preliminary Course can affect a student's ability to achieve their HSC in a 2 year period.

If Year 11 students have successfully completed their 6 Preliminary Courses (12 Units) they may then have the choice to drop ONE course in their HSC year and still qualify for their HSC and/or ATAR with 10 Units (5 subjects) of study. They will be given the choice to do this early in Term 4, once the N Determination process is completed by the school (approx. Week 4).









Year 12

Year 12 are in the final stretch of their 13 years of schooling, with the completion of their Trial HSC Exams at the end of Term 2. They are now completing their final units of work and will soon be in a solid pattern of revision and examination practise. This is invaluable time with your teachers and I encourage all Year 12 students to maximise your time in class and leave "no stone unturned" in pursuit of your goals.

For the students who are doing practical based subjects, it that time of year when major works and/ or performances are due. The following outlines final due dates for BOS deadlines:

- Industrial Technology Major Works (including FOLIOS) due Thursday 10th August 2017
- Visual Arts Body of Works due Monday 28th August 2017
- Music Performances for HSC Markers in the 2 weeks (Sept 4 – Sept 15, 2017)

The HSC Examinations commence on October 16 and conclude on November 7, 2017.



PBL Fortnightly Focus & Mini Lessons

Our Positive Behaviour for Learning theme for 2017 is being on the "ROAD to Success", with the acronym for R.O.A.D being (one per term):

Respect - Organisation - Attitude - Determination

Term 3 brings us to ATTITUDE (& application). Our first 2 mini lessons for the term looked at what it takes for students to achieve a '5' for Effort (100%) in

class on the their semester reports. Staff were surveyed and five (5) criteria were developed to give students a visible guide of what teachers looked for in their students, who were seen to be applying themselves to the best of their ability (100% effort).

The five (5) criteria developed are:

- 1) Regular attendance & punctuality
- 2) Packed for learning
- 3) Cooperative & respectful
- 4) Attentive & engaged
- 5) Application & seeking improvement

In the PBL mini lessons, students discussed these criteria and they were given samples of teachers' specific comments from the surveys in what they looked for, so that they could have a clear understanding of what is required to achieve a '5' for effort.

Banned Items: AEROSOL Cans

Students using deodorant sprays in the school environment is still a cause for

concern at times. We have a number of students and staff members who suffer from asthma and the prolific use of deodorant sprays, especially in enclosed environments, can bring about an asthma attack. Our students are regularly reminded that they should only be bringing a ROLL ON deodorant to school. Could you please ensure your children are not bringing deodorant sprays to school.

ABOUT ATTENDANCE

There continues to be a strong focus on student attendance at Richmond HS in 2017, with it being recognised as the first step on the ROAD to SUCCESS. Students are regularly reminded of the benefits of attending school every day; school personnel follow up students with concerning patterns of attendance; Department of Education interventions delivered for students whose attendance does not improve despite significant school interventions; and most importantly, strong recognition of students who maintain an excellent record of attendance.

Term 2 of 2017 ended with an increase in the number of students who had a perfect (100%) record of attendance for Semester 1 from last year. 54 students (an increase of 20%) were in attendance for all 97 days in Semester 1 and are still eligible for the 100% Regional Attendance Award at Presentation Night (as long as they do not have too many partial absences).

There were 87 students who attended school every day in Term 2, compared with 112 in Term 1.





Kanangra Walls to Katoomba – Duke of Ed

In the last week of the winter holidays Year 7 students set out on a three day hike from Kanangra Walls to Katoomba, in preparation for their trek along the Kokoda Trail.

The weather was cold but luckily not raining. Day 1 involved traversing along the top of Kanangra Walls and then along the ridge linking Kanangra Walls to Mount Stormbreaker and on to Mount Cloudmaker, reaching an elevation of 1164m. We then descended off Mount Cloudmaker and into Dex Creek, where we camped for the first night.

Day 2 saw a very picturesque walk along a ridge, surrounded by grass trees. We then descended from a height of around 850m down to the Cox's River at around 200m. After a quick stop and some time finding a suitable place to cross the river, we started the dreaded climb back up to the ridgeline. This involved climbing from the low river height back up to an elevation of around 800m. After around three hours of constant uphill we finally saw the ground start to level out. We made camp at Mobb's Swamp around 5:30pm and were well protected in a cave that fit our whole group and their tents.

Day 3 saw a windy trail leading out of camp but more defined tracks than previous days and still plenty of uphill. We finished at the end of the Megalong Valley around lunchtime and most were happy to get off their feet and relax in the sun.

A big thanks to Mr Turner for coming out to Kanangra Walls, picking up and returning the bus and to Mrs MacCormick for accompanying the group.

Beauty and the Beast (the count down is on!)

The countdown is on for excited students of Richmond High School who will be part of a history-making event in Beauty and the Beast, the musical. The collaboration between Richmond High and Richmond Players brings together the expertise of the longest running theatre company in Sydney and the extensive talent of our students in all areas of the performing arts.

At a recent rehearsal, some of our students were interviewed about their experiences so far.

Tom Baltaks of Year 11 is covering all bases with his versatile skill in dance, singing and some acrobatics and he guarantees to keep you on the edge of your seat saying "I have a few roles. Rug, wolf, villager, and I'll throw in a couple of cartwheels and backflips for you!" Tom's excitement was uncontainable when asked about the production; "It's awesome. I've never done anything even close to this before - this is massive! The set and the props are just really quality and the production team are awesome."

Tom says his favourite part of the musical is the ensemble number "Human Again" and Mchayela King and Jesse-Tayla King of Year 11 and 12 agree, "I like that song because the whole cast comes together and it's something to look forward to." This is the first musical for both of the girls and they are in awe of the cast, Mchayela saying, "the main characters have been selected so well and they are so good at their roles!" Jesse is so happy that she was able to be involved in her last year of school. "This is such a big thing for our school to do and it's pretty nerve wracking but also exciting. My mum is really surprised and happy that I

got myself into something like this."

Zeke Irving of Year 10 has performed in musicals before and is looking forward to bringing his experience to the stage again. His favourite part of Beauty and the Beast is "Gaston" and his willingness to learn from the cast is admirable when he says, "I love it because I can get into it and I can watch Matt (playing Gaston) and Simon (playing the Prince). They perform so well and I just want to get to that level one day. They are so good and they are pretty nice guys too." When asked if he'd do a musical like this again, Zeke says "in a heartbeat!"

His excitement is matched if not surpassed by **Paige Peters** of Year 8, another experienced performer who is a featured dancer in the production. Paige says, "I actually do love this play. I get to be a wolf and a cancan girl and the costumes are amazing. I love the part where Maurice comes into the woods and we are wolves - we do some tricks and it's a really intense scene."

Another one of the featured dancers is **Olivia Cassese** who is also in a Year 8. She says "I think it's pretty cool that we can do something this big at Richmond High. I'm kind of nervous but excited at the same time because I've never done anything like this before." Along with the others, Olivia shows a real appreciation of being able to perform with experienced theatre folk. She says "I think the leads are doing a really, really good job and they suit their parts so well. My family bought ten tickets and they're really excited! I'd definitely do it again. Red Nose Day 2017

Over the past 29 years Richmond High School has been recognised and valued by Red Nose (previously known as Sids and Kids) as being the largest school fundraisers nationally, with over \$500,000 raised to date. The money raised by the community



for Red Nose Day goes directly to Red Nose, the organisation dedicated to saving the lives of babies and children during pregnancy, birth, infancy and childhood as well as to support bereaved families. They fund research into stillbirth, SIDS and safe sleeping practices.




our Senior Leaders to continue the theme of Australian animals.


World Vision 40-Hour Famine Backpack Challenge




- Author Talk by Will Kostakis

Science Update from Mr Anderson

- Science and Engineering Challenge 2017

During the last two weeks, 18 students from Years 9 and 10 attended the annual Science and Engineering Challenge at Western Sydney University. Students worked in groups to solve problems and complete challenges, competing against students from other schools.

Some of the challenges included:

- Building a bridge to hold up a weighted trolley
- Building a straw and paper tower to withstand earthquake forces
- Developing a suspension system for a Mars Rover
- Working out the most efficient way to power model cities using different cost wires
- Making a working hand using straws and string
- Linking cities together with string in the most efficient way
- Communicating using coloured codes developed by the students

Students enjoyed the day and performed well. Any interested students are encouraged to attend next years' Science and Engineering Challenge.

- Robotics Challenge Workshop 2017

In the last week of Term 2, students from Years 9 and 10 Robotics and Tech Sciences Class attended a Robotics Challenge Workshop, held in the Trade Training Session.

The day was divided into three sessions. The challenge in Session 1 was to build the fastest robot. Students needed to use gear systems and programming to create the fastest design. Adryan Stacey, Son Tran and Connor Mirfin were successful in winning this challenge.

The challenge in Session 2 was to build and program a robot to follow a curved black line at the fastest rate. The challenge was much more difficult than it suggests and the team of **Nicholas Vecchio** and **Ryan Bugeja** won this challenge.

The final challenge was to combine the understanding from earlier sessions to build and program a robot to

move from the starting position, turn around at a black line and return to the starting position in the shortest time. With a shortened session due to students receiving reports, no winner was determined.

The day was very successful with students gaining further understanding about programming and designing robots for specific purposes.


Richmond High School Book Club
